

**TOKYO TOWER**  
[Akabanebashi Station]  
Toei Oedo Line

Built in 1958, Tokyo Tower stands 333 meters tall as a symbol of Japan's postwar rebirth. It offers stunning city views from two observation decks, especially at sunset. It captures the charm of both old and modern Tokyo in one perfect frame.



# TOKYO

## ICONIC SPOTS

Tokyo is full of landmarks that capture both its modern skyline and timeless charm. Each spot reveals a different side of the city waiting to be explored.

**ASAKUSA**  
[Asakusa Station]  
Toei Asakusa Line

Asakusa is where old Tokyo lives on. Home to Sensō-ji, Tokyo's oldest Buddhist temple, Asakusa shows a quieter, more traditional side of the city. Stroll along Nakamise Street for local snacks and souvenirs, and enjoy the view of Tokyo Skytree rising beyond the old temple roofs.



**SHIBUYA SCRAMBLE SQUARE**  
[Shibuya Station]  
JY JA JS G Z F IN DT TY

Located above Shibuya Station, this modern skyscraper offers shopping, dining, and one of Tokyo's best views. The Shibuya Sky observation deck on the 47th floor overlooks the famous crossing below and the city skyline — especially stunning at sunset.



**TOKYO SKYTREE**  
[Tokyo Skytree Station]  
TS Tobu Skytree Line

Tokyo Skytree stands 634 meters tall. From its observation decks, you can look out across the city — and on clear days, even see Mount Fuji in the distance. At the base, Tokyo Solamachi offers shops and cafés, perfect for spending a slow afternoon.

## SEASONS IN JAPAN



**SPRING**  
Spring in Japan is all about cherry blossoms. The weather is mild and breezy, perfect for strolling through Tokyo's gardens or Kyoto's temples.

**What to pack:** light jacket, sneakers, and allergy masks if you're sensitive to pollen.

**SUMMER**  
Summer brings fireworks festivals, Obon dances, and street food stalls. The weather is hot and humid.



**What to pack:** breathable clothes, a folding fan, sunscreen, and a reusable water bottle.



**AUTUMN**  
Crisp air and maple leaves make autumn a most photogenic season. It's also Japan's food season, with roasted chestnuts, mushrooms, and sweet potatoes.

**What to pack:** layered outfits, a light coat, and your camera.

**WINTER**  
Discover Japan's cozy side — snow-covered temples, ski trips, and hot springs. The air is crisp and dry, with chilly weather.



**What to pack:** warm coat, gloves, and scarf.



 Opened in 1978, Narita International Airport is located in Chiba Prefecture, about 60 kilometers east of central Tokyo. The airport has three terminals – Terminal 1 for major international airlines, Terminal 2 for many Asian and low-cost carriers, and Terminal 3 dedicated to budget airlines.

Narita Airport is about an hour from central Tokyo, so choosing the right route helps ensure a smooth arrival. Here are the main ways to get into the city.

FROM NARITA TO TOKYO



**Fastest**

**Narita Express (NEX)**

The fastest and most comfortable one. Fully covered by the Japan Rail Pass, with trains every 30-60 minutes. The NEX Tokyo Round-Trip Ticket (¥5,000) gives foreign travelers a discounted return within two weeks.

**Keisei Skyliner**

NARITA → NIPPORI → TOKYO

A slightly cheaper option with one easy transfer at Nippori Station. There are connections every 20-40 minutes. Ideal if you're staying in northern Tokyo or want flexibility with JR connections.

The JR Sobu Line (Rapid Service) is the slower but cheaper JR alternative to the Narita Express. The one way trip takes roughly 90 minutes and costs 1340 yen. There is about one departure per hour.

 Dashichazuke is a simple Japanese dish where hot broth is poured over rice and topped with ingredients. Dashichazuke En is well-known for its rich, high-quality dashi broth.

Haneda History

Opened in 1931, Haneda Airport is Tokyo's closest major airport, only about 20 minutes from the city center. It has three terminals—Terminal 1 and 2 for domestic flights, and Terminal 3 for most international routes—making travel simple and convenient.
